

In addition, everything Paulette undertakes for the Friends is accomplished with conscientiousness and good grace. She has been a most pleasant and valuable asset to the team, and thus worthy of the title Volunteer of the Year.

What We are Reading

Mary Lou Spanja reports that since the start of the holidays, she has not had time to begin anything new. It is all she can do to keep up with current events by reading the newspaper; however, she never misses the crossword puzzle! She also keeps up with *New Orleans* magazine.

Mary Lou states that when she *does* have time to start a new book, it will be one recommended by both Marie Breerwood and Joan Fontaine, who thought she would like it: *The Dressmaker of Khair Khana* by Gayle Tzemach Lemmon. It is the story of five sisters whose lives changed when the Taliban seized Afghanistan.

Jan DeVidts has just finished reading a book she terms "Excellent!" It is *One Thousand White Women: The Journals of May Dodd* by Jim Fergus. The setting is 1875 in the Black Hills of South Dakota, when The US government began a program to integrate white people into the Cheyenne nation. It hired women, mainly "undesirables," to live among the Cheyenne, propagate with them, and dilute their power. When gold was discovered in the area, the situation became *really* involved. The story is a fictionalized account of an actual set of events.

Jan says that it is the best book she has read in a long time, and rates it five stars.

Marie Breerwood has recently finished When Breath Becomes Air by Paul Kalanithi. Marie terms it "deep and inspiring, a real tear jerker." It is the inspirational and philosophical memoir of a young neurosurgeon with Stage 4 cancer, who attempts to answer the question, "What makes life worth living?" Marie says that Dr. Kalanithi's book has been on the Bestseller list, and though by no means enjoyable to read, well worth the reading. She rates it four stars.

A Name from the Past: Sorting and Amazon-packing groups will never cease missing Kuniko Izumi, who now lives in Kentucky. Recently, Kuniko sent President Anna Campos a card thanking her and others for the Amazon tutorial they gave her during her last visit to Metairie. Kuniko has started listing and shipping books and DVDs through Amazon and eBay for her present Kentucky Friends group. She says that the most expensive book that she has sold was *The Spirit of St. Louis* by Charles Lindbergh, for which she got \$700.00!

Speaking of Amazon, during late December and early January, our enterprise was "slammed" with books to be packaged and mailed. The crush was caused by a combination of factors: unusual weekend holiday closings of the library and the post office, out of-town trips, and some holiday scheduling conflicts of usual packers. On one day, 32 books needed to be packed and mailed. Unfortunately, the Amazon giant doesn't care what our problems are, and will "remind" us if shipments are late. Fortunately, Diane Schleifstein and Kathy Brady were up to the challenge; it took them 2½ hours of solid work to finish the project that day. But the following week it happened again with 36 books, and they were required to put in another marathon performance. As an Amazon side note, Joan Demers, founder of our Amazon team, has not been traveling as much lately, and has been coming around on Wednesday afternoons to assist with packing or with troubleshooting any other problems that arise. We are all happy to have **Joan** back in the fold.

The bridge between Sorting and Amazon:
Some people and conversations span both sorting and Amazon enterprises at the center. I, the Shadow, happen to be privy to the overlap, as I am part of both groups. When Anna Campos realized that Sue H. does not own a "happy phone," as she calls it, she jokingly offered to pass the hat and purchase one for her. Sue declined. Judy Z. uses her cell

The team packs on the 3rd Thursday of every month, or whenever everyone can get together. They pack 7-9 boxes with 30 packets each per month. Included in the literature are library locations, their hours of operation, and information on how to obtain a library card. These packets each contain a children's book. They are distributed to Ochsner West Bank, Ochsner in Kenner and West Jefferson Hospital by Sue Hellwig and Chris deVillasana. Kudos for the worthy service

these Friends provide to the hospitalized children, and to babies and new mothers of Jefferson parish.

At the Store, there were quite a few challenges in the year 2016. According to Patricia Cox, Store Manager, the biggest challenge was the recarpeting; but thanks to the help of many volunteers and a great library crew, the entire task was completed in four days.

Another challenge was **Sandra Blount's** unfortunate encounter at home with a step ladder that kept her out of commission for several weeks. Instead of floundering without their **volunteer coordinator**, super volunteers stepped up to cover the shifts.

A new credit card machine with a "chip detector" presented still another challenge that had store salespersons wishing for the old one back. Through it all, however, the store not only survived, but thrived!

The last store shopping day before Christmas was certainly a red letter day for **Milly Spear**. The Friends' current **co-Volunteer of the Year** happily broke all previous records with over \$400.00 in sales.

What's Cooking at the Friends?

Carrot Souffle

(Maria Tujague has brought this tasty dish to Friends covered dish events.)

1 1/2 lbs carrots, peeled and sliced

3/4 cup butter or margarine, softened

3 large eggs

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar

1/4 tsp. cinnamon

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly spray a casserole dish (1 1/2 quarts?—ed.) and set aside. Cook carrots in boiling water until tender; drain. In bowl or food processor, combine carrots and all other ingredients and process until smooth, stopping once to scrape down sides of bowl. Spoon into prepared dish. Bake for about 1 hour, or until set and lightly browned. Serves 6.
