



She just couldn't stay away from those children, so from 2012 to 2018 she worked as an Early Steps instructor, seeing children in their homes and at day care facilities.

She believes that she has never worked with a nicer, more supportive group who all share the same goal of earning money to support the Jefferson Parish Library System. Rose loves being around books and people who enjoy reading, both of which allow for a stimulating exchange of ideas.

Rose considers it an honor to be asked to serve on the board and to further support the goal of "finding good homes for used books."

Spring to you!

Many of us celebrated its advent with our Big Book Sale on April 12-14. If you were there, you know what I mean. As anticipated, it was a bountiful boon to book dealers, customers, teachers, and our Jefferson Public Library alike. The Friends succeeded in raising over \$55,000 in 2 ½ days! After expenses, we netted approximately \$38,500 for the library, not counting the residuals that will keep coming in for several months due to sales by Thrift Books. They took our leftovers on consignment.

It was hard work with set-up, cashiering, continual re-organizing, assisting customers, and of course, takedown, but we had a lot of fun, too. Personally, I love seeing customers' expressions when I tally up their purchases and announce their totals. Many who pay with cash then tell

me, "Keep the change for the library." Everybody goes away happy!

Two new additions to our usual line-up added levity to our work this time. The first was a volunteer "security guard," **Tim McLanahan**, who joined our regular security guard manning the floor. He greatly

helped with crowd management with his professional dress, stern looks and dark shades, and our customers were safer and none the wiser. The second was the addition during our sale lunch times of Jo Ann Rosenfeld, who volunteered to serve as "assistant hostess" to Hospitality Hostess, Judy Welcker. She was a great help to Judy by facilitating food/ice distribution, and her offers of a napkin or the phrase, "Can I get you something to drink?" Believe me, these were welcome words to volunteers sitting down for the first time in hours!

At the end of the sale, 27 teachers who had pre-registered, representing 16 different schools received 55 boxes of free books. It was a fitting end to a perfect sale.

<u>The Sale Thank You Brunch</u> was held in the Jefferson and Napoleon meeting rooms of the library for the first time in many years. **Peg Phelps** and **Judy Zawislak**, co-chairs of the Book Sale, presented all of the pertinent numbers. The food catered by Caffe Latte Da and the camaraderie were enjoyed by all.

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<u>Then, business by Sorting, Amazon, the</u>
<u>Store, eBay and their many sub-groups resumed,</u>
<u>as usual,</u> at full speed.

Our taxes were e-filed by **Ralph Cox**, who has been generously filing them for many years. Thank you, Ralph! The Friends greatly appreciate what you do for us.

eBay and the Internet have been busy, as

well. eBay has sold numerous interesting items recently, most notably a \$200 book about the Krewe of Comus, and a hand mirror for \$75. With each passing month, eBay has become a more viable and valuable fund-raising tool for the Friends to utilize. During the past two months, Internet (Amazon) sales have netted \$6,260 to add to our kitty to be donated to the library. Kudos to all of the ladies who work in these departments.

In her capacity as Facebook facilitator for our <u>Social Media</u> sub-group, <u>Michele Thomassie</u> reports that the Friends' Facebook page followers have begun to increase in number. She is predicting that numbers will increase at a greater rate when our newly-minted QR code begins to appear on all of our printed literature. "Young people with cell phones know how to use QR codes," Michele told the board, "and will use them to find out what resources we have available."

<u>Volunteers abound!</u> We surely have a lot of new, productive—and younger—volunteers. We love them because they have new ideas, such as the QR code, and a lot of energy to share. They fit in just fine, too; we have a lot to teach them as well, and they are enjoying the process. **Sharon Simmons**, in charge of quantifying/reporting on volunteer services, says that Friends are averaging

68 volunteering members per month who total approximately 1,100 hours of work. Wow. It will be interesting to find out what the numbers will reveal in May, when she reports on our book sale.

Raise-a-Reader. Recently, Sandra Blount and Sue Craig, active R-a-R volunteers, attended a West Jefferson Medical Center Family Health Expo. They handed out Raise-a-Reader packets and Spring Book Sale book marks. On another occasion, Sue and Sandra delivered boxes of Raise-a-Reader materials to West Jefferson Hospital, Ochsner West Bank and Ochsner in Kenner, to be distributed to new mothers. Crescent City Family Services will also soon begin receiving boxes of packets as part of the WIC (Women, Infants, Children) Program. Not all arms of the Friends raise money, it seems, but all of our arms are concerned with promoting reading as a lifetime activity. We plant many seeds, and only time will tell what they will produce.

Purchases for the Library. The Friends have made some new purchases at the request of the library. They wanted four rotating Scrabble boards for their "Scrabble Scrambles," and two Genealogy books for the East Bank Regional Special Collections Department. The Friends' board unanimously also accepted Children's Librarian Erin Korosi's request for monies to help underwrite her Summer Reading Program. It will serve Babies through 5th Grade, 6th through 12th Grade Teens, and Adults by providing incentives and prizes for the program. The cost to the Friends will be \$9,364.70. In 2023, 6,934 Jefferson Parish residents registered and participated in the program, and 2,395 completed it.

Bits & Pieces to make you shake your head or to chuckle. As you must know, I love to watch

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and listen to people. Just last week I found out that **Sue Craig** *still* talks to herself... and now answers herself back. You should hear her when she is struggling to evaluate a "naughty" (her word) comic book or graphic novel. What she actually does with them all is to take them to a comic book dealer she knows, and then trade them for plastic sleeves to protect the comics that she takes to the Sale. I found out, too, that she puts the *really* naughty ones in the trash! Times have surely changed from my "Little Lulu" days.

Jo Ann Rosenfeld came to the March board meeting in special regalia: a tiara and sash that were given to her on the event of her 80th birthday. Her birthday had actually passed, but she claims she was still entitled because she had been celebrating all month!

What's cooking at the Friends?

DARN GOOD CHOCOLATE CAKE

1 Chocolate cake mix (I have used Duncan Hines Devil's Food, German Chocolate, and Swiss Chocolate. All worked well)

6 Tbs. flour (to compensate for the smaller sized cake mixes)

1 small pkg. instant chocolate pudding

4 eggs

1 cup sour cream

1/2 cup each warm water and vegetable oil

1-1/2 cups chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.



Coat 12 cup Bundt pan with cooking spray, then dust with flour. Shake out excess flour. Set aside.

Place cake and pudding mix, eggs, sour cream, water and oil in large mixing bowl. Blend with mixer on low speed 1 minute. Stop and scrape down sides of bowl; increase speed to medium and beat 1 to 3 minutes more, scraping sides down again, if needed. Batter should be thick and well combined. Fold in chocolate chips; mix well. Pour batter into pan, smoothing with spatula. Place in oven.

Bake cake until it springs back when lightly pressed with finger and starts to pull away from sides of pan, 45 to 55 minutes. (Since the consistency of this cake is like a pudding, testing for doneness with a toothpick does not work!) Remove pan from oven and place on wire rack to cool 20 minutes. Invert onto rack, remove from pan, and cool 20 minutes more. For a nice effect, use a sifter to sprinkle some confectioner's sugar over cake. Serve warm if possible.
